NJ Legislative Updates



School House Rock "Just A Bill"

'Skip the Stuff' Waste Reduction Law

[A-5157/S-3195](#)

- Signed by Gov. Phil Murphy to reduce plastic waste and pollution
- Timeline:
 - **August 1, 2026:** food service business prohibited from providing single-use utensils and condiments
 - Casual dining may offer these by request / with self-serve stations
 - Full-service restaurants may provide by request for online orders
 - **August 1, 2027:** Bundled packages containing more than one type of single-use utensil or condiment are prohibited
 - Pre-packaged food items are exempt if they contain single-use utensils or condiments attached when manufactured
- All K-12 schools, licensed health care facilities, and county or State correctional facilities are exempt
- Food service businesses located in food courts are exempt until August 1, 2028



Additional 2026 Recycling Laws

- **Food Waste Reduction Plans at the County Level** [S2426/A2090](#)
 - Requiring all SWMDs to amend their SWMPs to develop and implement plans for reducing their generated food waste by at least 50% by 2035, utilizing 2022 generation numbers.
 - This allows for revised rules for composting facilities.
 - NJDEP is currently working on guidance out to the County's shortly.
- **Solar Panel Recycling** [S3399/A6005](#)
 - Requiring owners, producers, distributors, or manufacturers of solar and photovoltaic generation facilities and structures to remove and recycle or refurbish any related equipment or infrastructure after the termination of their use.
 - 1st step towards setting up Extended Producer Responsibility (EPR) for these panels/equipment.
- **Use of Recycled Content Plastic Construction Products in State Jobs** [S3802/A5394](#)
 - State-funded construction projects must use plastic materials containing at least 10% postconsumer recycled content. After two years, this will increase to 15%.
 - Applies to construction materials composed of more than 50% plastic by cost.

Additional 2026 Recycling Laws

- **Food Waste Reduction at NJ Colleges and Universities** [S3889/A5387](#)
 - Requires every higher-education institution in NJ to implement a food-waste reduction program and submit annual reports detailing surplus food donations and composting efforts.
- **Soil Transport & Recycling Licensing Modifications** [S4877/A6179](#)
 - Amendment to “Dirty Dirt” law
 - Addresses the problem of contaminated soil being sold as clean fill, clarifying licensing requirements for the transport of soil, and modifies the definition of “soil and fill recyclable materials.”
- **Scrap Tire Hauler License** [S4630/A5851](#)
 - The NJDEP is directed to establish a scrap tire hauler licensing system and a regulatory framework for scrap tire storage, collection, and management

2026 Recycling Bills

- **Community Gardens On-Site Composting Exemption [S312/A1872](#)**
 - Exempts community gardens operating on-site composting systems or other systems of managing organic waste from certain DEP permits under certain conditions.
- **Scrap Metal Facility Safety Regulatory Improvements [A2401](#)**
 - Establishes measures to improve the safety of scrap metal businesses.

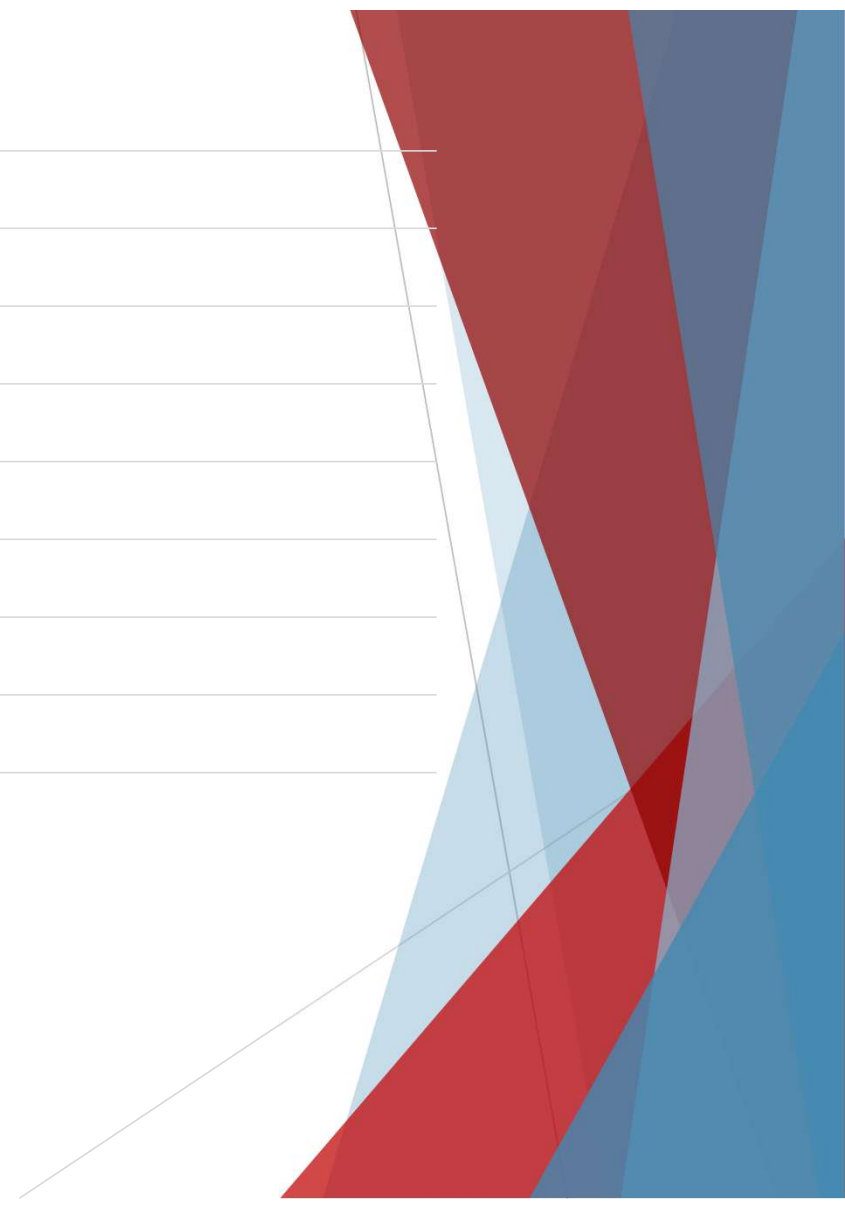


Glass 3 Color Mix (Per Ton Price) 2026

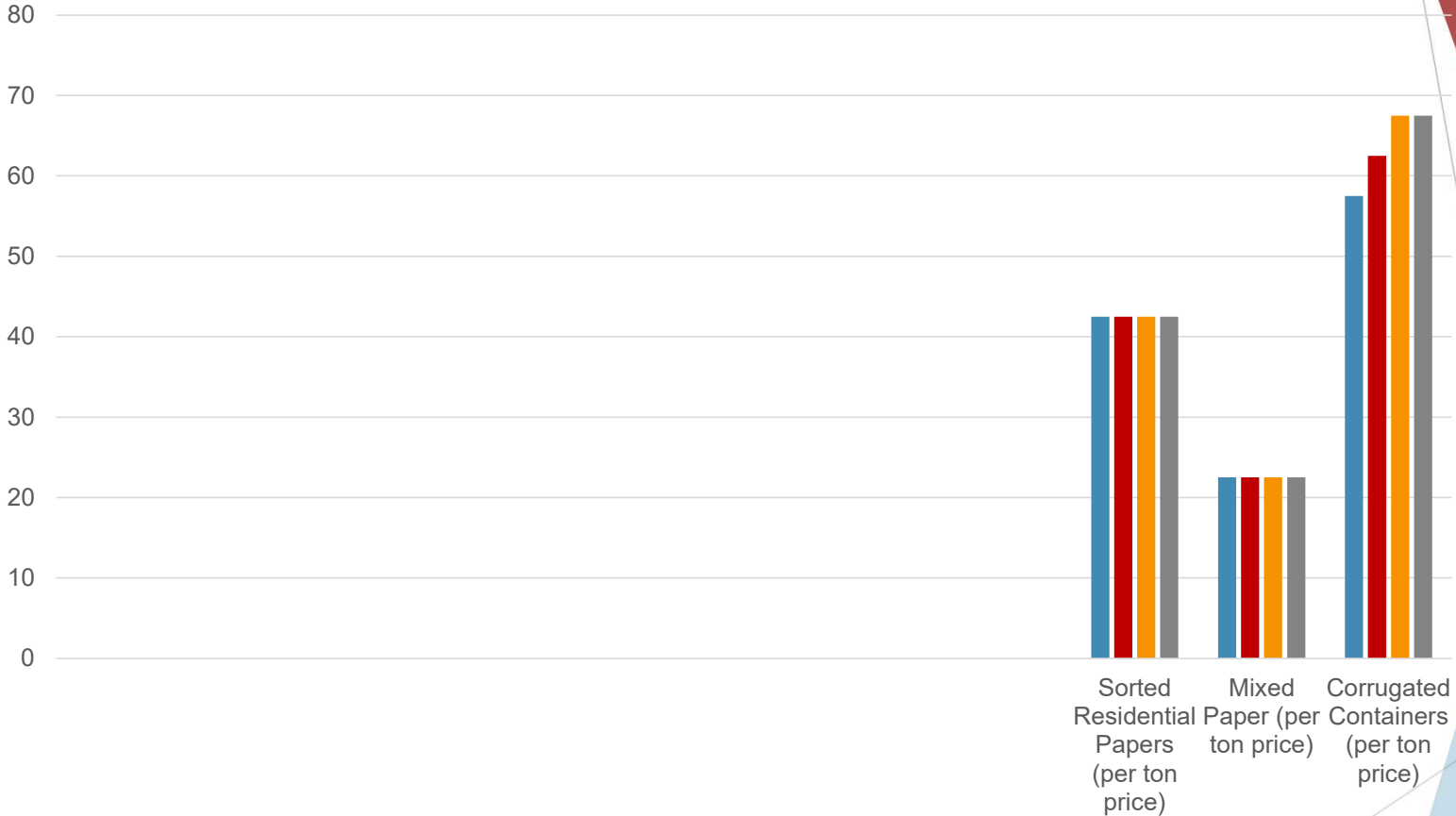

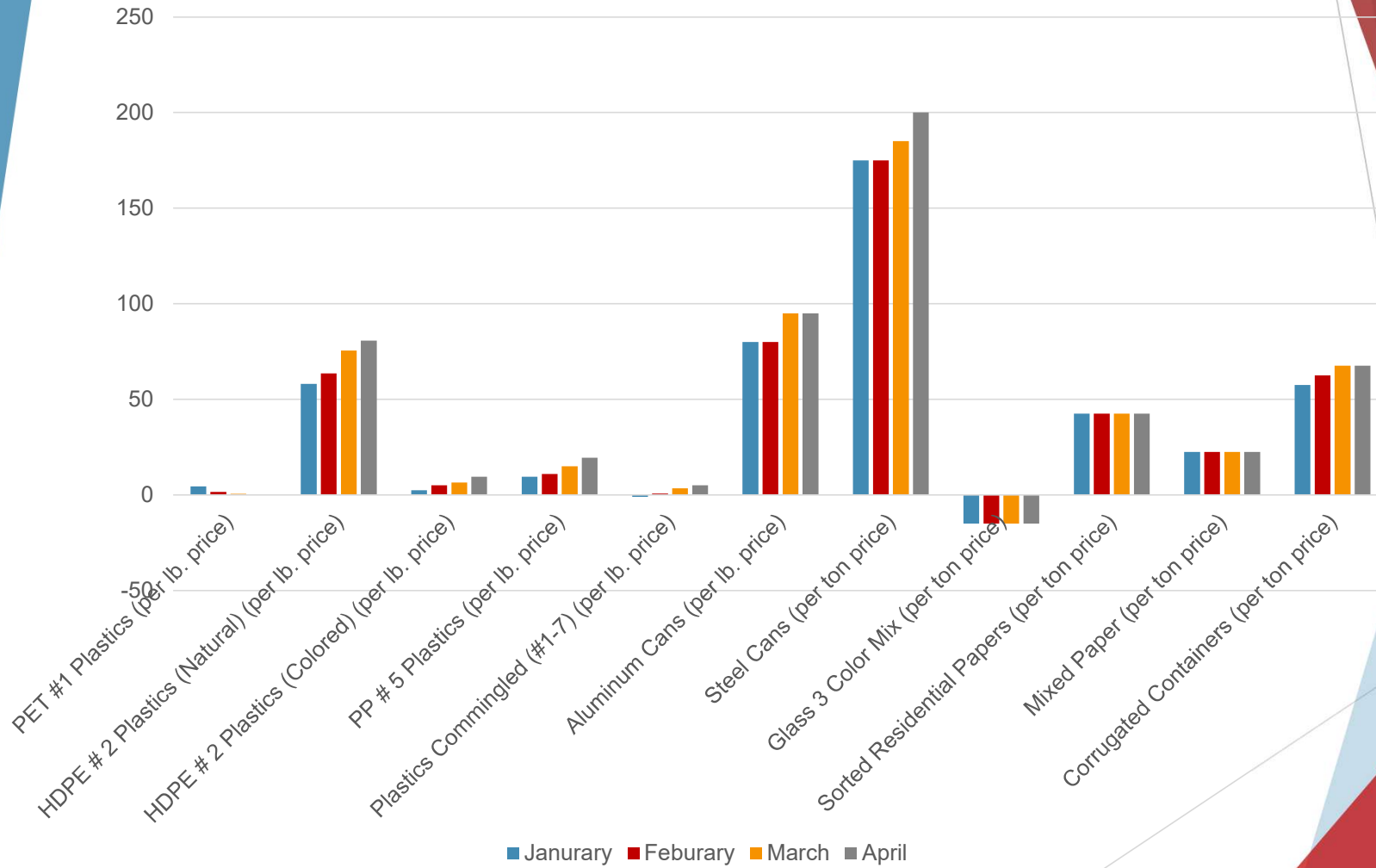


Fiber 2026

Tackling Food Waste in Morris County

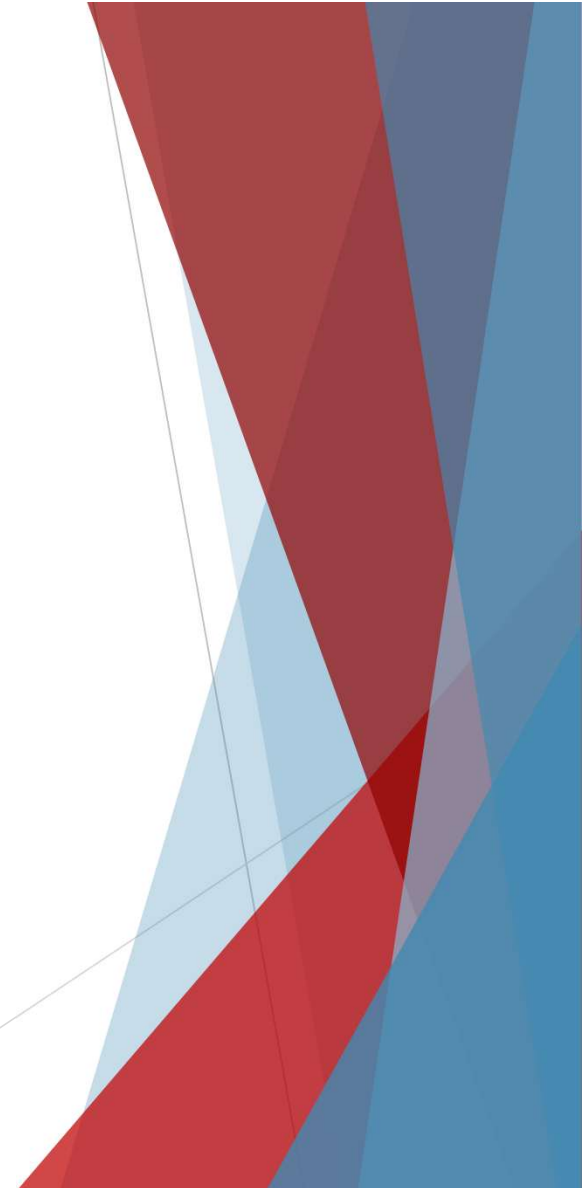


Food waste is a major problem with major consequences...

- Up to **40%** of our food supply goes uneaten. Annually, this wasted food represents:
 - the most prevalent materials landfilled and incinerated in the U.S. (**24% of landfilled MSW** and **22% of combusted MSW**)
 - **16% of the cropland** used to grow food in the US
 - More **blue water consumption** than in 50 million American homes
 - Hundreds of millions of pounds of **pesticides** and billions of pounds of **fertilizer** annually
 - **2% of all US energy consumption**
 - **25% of total North American greenhouse gas emissions**, including land use from agriculture and land use change, and not including emissions from landfills
 - **58% of fugitive methane emissions** from landfills
 - **\$382 billion** in 2023, or \$1 trillion globally
 - 18 billion animals, hundreds of millions of eggs, up to 120 billion pounds of produce annually
 - Packaging waste and associated environmental impacts

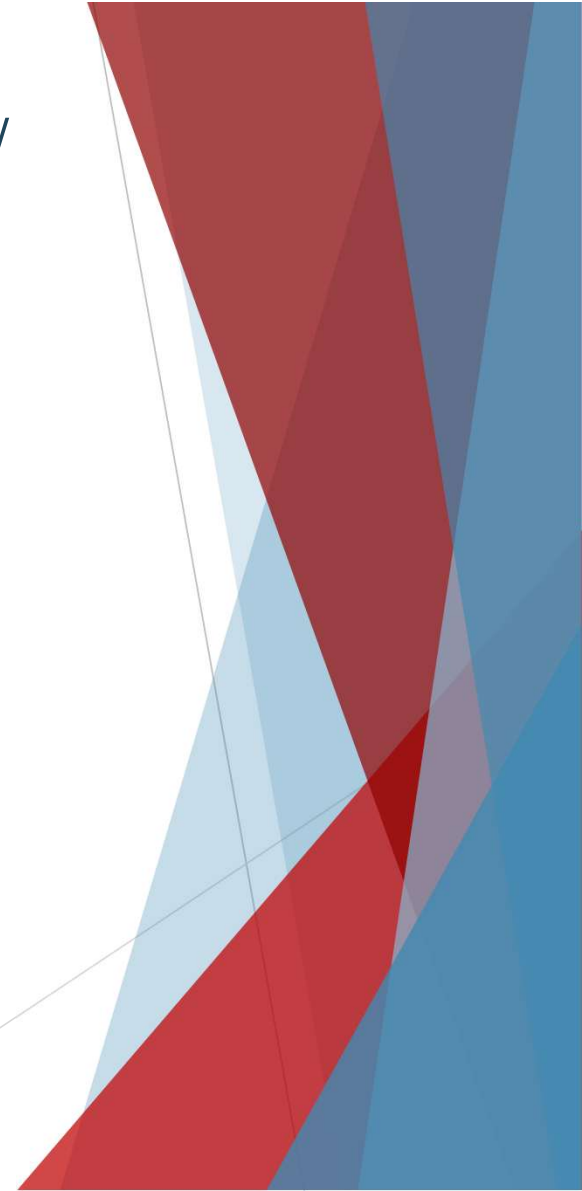
Existing New Jersey Food Waste Legislation

- 2020 Food Waste Recycling and Food Waste to Energy Production Law (NJSA 13:1E-99.122)
 - Large generator requirement
 - The number of food waste recycling facilities in the state is still small
- 2023 School Food Waste Recycling Law (N.J.S.A. 13:1E-99.115a)
 - Allows schools to collect food scraps for in-vessel composting and anaerobic digestion, and allows schools to transport material to other schools with such a system
- 2026 Food Waste Reduction and Composting Law
 - Solid waste districts to amend SWMPs with a strategy to reduce food waste in the district by 50%
 - DEP to publish tiered regulatory structure for open-air composting



MCMUA's Phased Approach to Understanding Food Waste in Morris County

- Phase I: SWOT (Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, Threats) Analysis
- Phase II: Morris County Food Rescue Assessment
 - Evaluate opportunities for food rescue and address gaps and limitations
 - Focus efforts on redistributing excess food to address food insecurity
- Phase III: Food Waste Business Challenge



Preview of Lessons Learned from Morris County's Food Waste Rescue Assessment

- Morris County has a robust food assistance landscape and many opportunities to supplement it by improving food rescue.
- Major challenges are posed by logistical issues and misalignment between the available surplus and the needs/wants of the recipient organization:
 - Need for storage space, especially cold storage
 - Need for transportation
 - Scheduling conflicts between donors and recipients
 - Reliance on volunteers
 - Overabundance of items that are challenging to repurpose through food assistance

Why Should My Business Reduce My Food Waste?

Tax Deductions
Depending on the type of corporation your business is, you may deduct donated food inventory up to 15% of taxable income ([IRC §170\(e\)\(2\)](#)).

NJDEP Regulations
New Jersey is creating new food waste regulations that you may be required to follow. Visit <https://dep.nj.gov/dshw/swpl/fw/> for more info.

Liability Protection
The Bill Emerson Good Samaritan Food Donation Act provides federal liability protection.

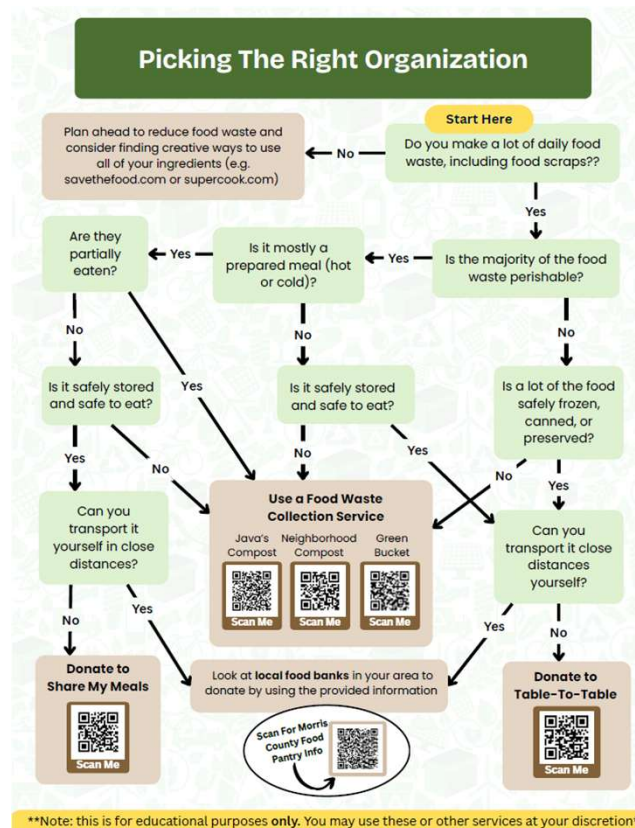
Help Local Food Insecurity

Reducing Waste Through Donation

Reducing food waste by donating surplus food instead of throwing it away is one of the most effective ways to support both environmental sustainability and community wellbeing. According to the USDA, approximately 30-40% of the food supply in the United States is wasted. When edible food is discarded, it not only wastes the resources used to produce it, but also contributes to greenhouse gas emissions as it decomposes in landfills. By donating excess food to local food banks, shelters, and community organizations, individuals, schools, and businesses can help close the gap between food waste and food insecurity. Many people in our communities struggle to access fresh, nutritious meals, and donations of safe, edible food can make a meaningful difference.

Where to Donate/Receive Food

Across Morris County, many food assistance organizations welcome donations from individuals, businesses, and institutions. Each organization has its own storage capacity and specific needs, so it's important to check their guidelines before donating or receiving food. Projects may include the following:



- Improvements to equipment and educational signage in existing recycling programs (e.g., containers, lids)
- Specialized reuse programs (e.g., [lending library](#), salvage sheds, community swap events, [Repair Cafe](#))
- Backyard composting programs
- Recycling or donation drives for specific materials (e.g., clothes, shoes, books, electronics)
- Recycling programs for non-mandated materials
- Greening community events that incorporate [zero-waste planning](#)
- Educational campaigns and other initiatives highlighting food waste
- Food waste collection pilot programs
- Other projects that meet the grant program objectives



Environmental Commissions may partner with other community groups, such as schools, nonprofits, or other municipal departments, on projects to improve recycling and waste prevention. Group projects could include the following:

- Food waste minimization projects (e.g., food waste audits, cafeteria ["Share Tables"](#))
- School-wide or other establishment-wide educational campaigns (e.g., "Trashless Tuesday", building-wide recycling signage, and/or container installation)
- Composting or worm bin projects
- Waste audits and minimization projects
- Reuse and upcycling projects (e.g., swap events, materials reuse station for school supplies, books, etc.)
- Recycling in the classroom
- Recycling/reuse educational [field trips](#) (e.g., local recycling depot, reuse center, recycling center, compost demonstration)
- Greening events incorporate zero-waste planning
- Other projects that meet the grant program objectives

Applications must demonstrate approval from other project partners (e.g., Corporate or School Green Teams, Board of Education, non-profits, other municipal departments, etc.).

- The MCMUA is offering mini-grants of up to **\$1,500 to four Morris County Environmental Commissions** for recycling and waste-prevention projects.
- Grants can fund part or the entire project.
- Proposals must be approved in writing by the MRC and Mayor or Township Administrator/Manager before submission.
- Each project must have a designated Environmental Commission member as the leader and point of contact.
 - If there's no Environmental Commission, another suitable municipal committee may apply.
- Grant packets were emailed to the Municipal clerk to be forwarded to the EC point of contact, MRC, and Mayor/Town Administrator/Manager the first week of April.
